## **April 2024 Newsletter**

This is a wonderful time of year. The weather is starting to warm up, although we of course have to have a few final touches of winter. With the improvement in the weather the flowers are beginning to bloom, the trees and grass are turning green again and the birds are singing. I love seeing all the beautiful birds that have been flitting around in the bushes and the trees around the church and parsonage. We are seeing the beginnings of spring, and with spring we celebrate Easter, which will be the day before April starts this year. There is a lot going on this time of year. Spring reminds us that even though the earth seemed to have been dead, there can be new life, which is something that is always comforting to me. That is also what we celebrate during this Easter season. Although Christ died on the tree and was placed in a grave with the stone sealing Him in, and all hope seemed lost, three days later Christ conquered death once and for all.

I've heard many Easter sermons over the years, and have now preached my share. Many of those used images of the earth being reborn in the spring or even of a caterpillar that emerges from the cocoon as a butterfly, as an example of the way in which Christ conquered death. But as I was reminded of, from another sermon I read one time, which I believe was written by Karl Barth, none of these images are sufficient, because the earth and the caterpillar are merely sleeping. The trees go into hibernation, much like bears, to awaken with the warmer weather and longer days. The caterpillars may go into the cocoon, but although it may be a painful process of breaking down and rebuilding, they are being transformed into something beautiful.

Jesus, on the other hand, was fully dead. Not sleeping, but dead and gone. All hope seemed lost—His disciples were disillusioned and locked into the house where they were staying because of fear; the religious authorities thought that they had won, that they had silenced Him for good. But come Sunday morning, the impossible happened—Jesus walked out of that tomb and is alive and well, as was attested to by many faithful witnesses. This is the heart of the gospel message. Jesus took our sins upon Himself and died a sinner's death—all for us, because he loves us. And then He conquered death and extends that victory to all who would follow after Him.

I know in the world in which we live, there are many who have begun to question whether Jesus really rose from the dead. I have even heard churches and even preachers profess that you don't need to believe in the actual bodily resurrection of Jesus. The resurrection of Jesus is something that doesn't make sense to our science-enlightened minds, but there are many things in this world that science cannot explain. All science can do is try to explain how things work, as they observe the workings of creation, but it can never answer the why, which is really the question of who—who created everything and set things in motion. Although the resurrection can be hard to

understand, the biggest proof for me is that His disciples testified to Jesus' resurrection until the end. And their ends were often brutal and painful, because of their commitment to the Risen Lord. I know I would never die for something I know to be a lie. I don't know of any who would. All of the disciples went to their graves preaching about the risen Jesus. Because of Jesus' resurrection, we now have the promise that we will also share in the resurrection, when Christ returns in glory. In 1 Corinthians, chapter 15, Paul says that Jesus was the first fruits of the resurrection, so His resurrection is the guarantee that ours is coming. "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ" (1 Corinthians 15: 20-23. We can live in the confidence that we serve a Risen Lord, who is coming back again in glory. Just as we celebrate creation awakening with the spring, let us celebrate Jesus' resurrection from the dead, knowing that He now offers us victory over death, hell, and the grave. We might never truly understand it all this side of heaven, but we don't have to, we just need to accept it. May you experience the joy of the resurrection during this Easter-tide, and every day of the year! The blessings of the Risen Christ be with you!
